The directory includes descriptions of the many services currently offered to you by the Youth Bureau and other agencies. It contains information about many local health and human service programs that are ready to assist you.



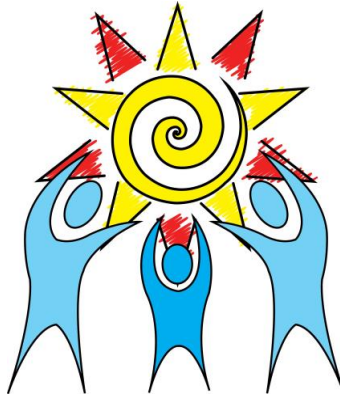

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INTRODUCTION

WHAT IS THE YOUTH BUREAU?

The Youth Bureau's mission is to promote positive youth development, coordinate services for all youth in Orange County; and to develop and fund local programs.

The Youth Bureau is a coordinating agency for youth programming as directed by the organizational guidelines set forth by the NYS Office of Children and Family Services (OCFS). The Youth Bureau channels OCFS funding to local municipalities and community-based organizations based on the needs in the Integrated County Plan for Youth. A list of funded agencies and more information can be obtained by calling the Youth Bureau office or visiting the website.

In addition, the Youth Bureau coordinates several funded and unfunded initiatives including Partners for Children (coalitions and action teams), Youth and Families; Children and Family Services Plan; Runaway and Homeless Youth Services; Safe School Ambassadors; Youth-in- Government Day; County Summer Volunteer Program; Annual County Executive's Youth Awards Luncheon; and the Annual Youth-Adult Summit. The Orange County Youth Bureau is a model in New York State, often participating in partnership with the New York State Office of Children and Family Services Office of Youth Development and the Association of New York State Youth Bureaus in cutting edge positive youth development program planning, coordinating, and evaluation pilot projects.

Research by Search Institute has identified 40 concrete, positive experiences and qualities-"developmental assets"-that have a tremendous influence on young people's lives and they are things that people from all walks of life can help to nurture.

Listed below are the 40 developmental assets that youth need to grow up to be competent, caring and healthy. Helping youth to develop these assets depends primarily on individuals - parents, grandparents, teachers, neighbors and many others - building positive relationships with children and teenagers. Nearly all children and adolescents need more developmental assets than they now have. While it is crucial to pay special attention to those children who have the least economically and emotionally, the challenge is to reclaim the kind of community-wide attention to positive development that will impact ALL young people.

Working Papers for Youth:

Working papers serve as official employment certificates. You will need working papers if you are under 18 years old. Working papers are divided into two age groups (*14-15 and 16-17*). If you are in school, go to your guidance office and ask for a working papers application. If you are not in school, go to the nearest school by where you live because they are required to give you the

application. Fill out the application and have your parent or guardian sign the application. When you have filled out the working papers application and had your parent or guardian sign it, you have to take it back to the school's guidance office. You will also need to have had a doctor's exam within the last 12 months saying you are physically fit. A physical given at a school for sports will count for your physical exam. If you are not sure where you can get a physical, ask your guidance office or call your doctor.

14-15 year olds - Your working papers are blue. If you are 14 and 15 years old, you are issued these working papers because you are not allowed to work in a factory.

16-17 year olds (in school) - Your working papers are green. The difference between 14-15 year old working papers and 16-17 year old working papers is that you are allowed to work in a factory. You cannot work around certain machines, do construction work, help on a motor vehicle, clean, oil, wipe, or adjust belts on machinery

16-17 year olds (out of school) - Your working papers are peach. If you are 16 - 17 years old and are not in school or are leaving school for full time employment, you will need these working papers. You can work in a factory, cannot work around certain machines, do construction work, help on a motor vehicle, or clean, oil, wipe, or adjust belts on machinery.

When you turn 16, you will need to go from your 14-15 year old working papers (blue) and get your 16-17 year old working papers (green). Go to your guidance office of your school or nearest school to update your working papers.

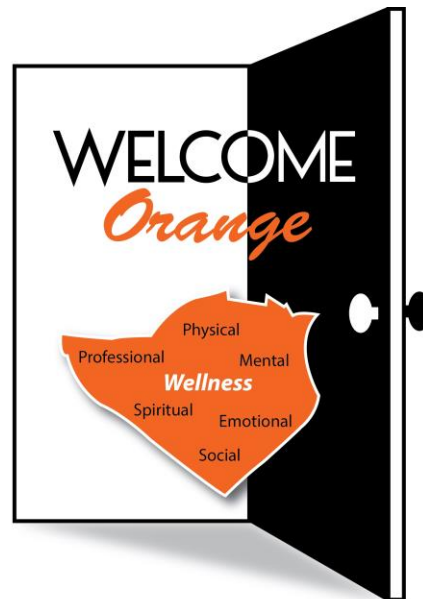

Partners provide training, technical assistance, outreach and advocacy for the benefit of the community. Mini-grants are allocated for a variety of conferences and events for youth and adults.

The Orange County Youth Bureau continues to be a valuable training resource.

Youth Mental Health First Aid: Teaches the risk factors and warning signs of a variety of mental health challenges common among adolescents. Participants learn to support a youth developing signs and symptoms of a mental illness or in an emotional crisis by applying a core five-step action plan.

Positive Youth Development 101: Trains youth workers the skills to intentionally guide the development of youth in positive and impactful ways. The knowledge and resources that participants take from the training will enhance their own understanding and ability to connect with youth on a variety of levels.

Strengthening Families: Seven-week workshop series for parents/caregivers and their children that covers a variety of topics including; raising children with love and limits and establishing and maintaining effective communication with your children. Childcare and a family meal are provided at every workshop.

Safe School Ambassadors: Interactive and empowering skill development program offered to middle and high schools that trains selected students in techniques designed to allow them to recognize and safely address individual acts of student-on-student mistreatment occurring in school and online.

Girls Circle & Boys Council Girls Circle is an evidence-based program for girls aged 9-18 that promotes emotional and developmental growth and increased positive interpersonal connections. Boys Council offers a strengths-based group approach to promoting boys' and young men's safe and healthy passage through pre-teen and adolescent years. Each program is delivered in 10 group sessions.

Narcan: Narcan/Naloxone training teaches participants to recognize the signs and symptoms of an opioid overdose and teaches them to administer Narcan/Naloxone, which can reverse the effects of opiate overdose. Narcan/Naloxone kits are provided in the training.

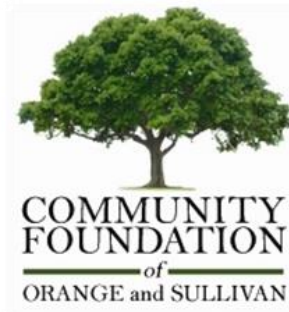
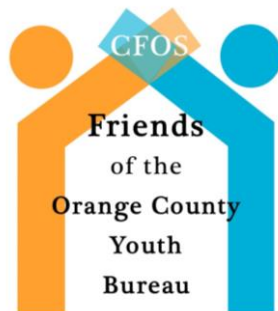
